One Great Hour of Sharing Where Is Your Treasure?

2009 Theme, Scripture Reference Matt 5:21

If you were searching for God's treasure, you'd find it in people. Every person, in every nation on earth, is treasured by God! Yet for many people, life can be searingly tough.

One Great Hour of Sharing joins our hearts with God's by providing decisive aid when disaster strikes and by helping refugees rebuild their lives. Your gift strengthens struggling communities with basics like education, health care, tools, seeds, and wells.

1. What is One Great Hour of Sharing?

One Great Hour of Sharing, as part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in more than eighty countries. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water and food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, emergency relief, and advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

2. Who participates in One Great Hour of Sharing?

Nine Christian denominations—American Baptist Church, African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Church of the Brethren, Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Presbyterian Church, Reformed Church in America, United Church of Christ, The United Methodist Church, and Church World Service work together to develop common promotional materials thereby sharing ideas, costs, and a commitment to faithful service. Each denomination receives and manages its respective OGHS offerings.

3. How is the United Church of Christ's offering used?

More than 60 percent of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives, including annual support for approximately six missionaries working in health care, education, and agricultural development. Gifts are also used for disaster preparedness and response, refugee and immigration advocacy and assistance, and disaster and refugee related volunteer initiatives.

An Offering of Gold

Starting a new job is always stressful. My first week at Cottage Grove United Church of Christ went well, but by the end of it my head was spinning. I still don't have it quite unwound yet, and I expect it will take several more weeks before I do. What should go in which drawers of my new desk, how should I organize my (many) books in

the lovely bookcases you provided for me, where should I put my pictures and knickknacks? Who's on the prayer concerns list and why? Who are the confirmation students and what have they been studying...and why do they have green hair? Who do I talk to about what and where do I locate them? How do the various ministry teams function? How and by whom is worship planned? What is everyone's name and who's related to whom?

The trouble is, then I start to get the *answers* to these questions, which means that my brain gets filled with more and more information. Every church does everything a little differently, so things may be totally different here than they were at the church I served as pastor in Baltimore, Maryland or the church I served before that in Sacramento, California. Things I thought I knew become null and void, and I am a "new minister" all over again. In short, my head is spinning.

Then, in the midst of all of this, I suddenly notice the silent prairie outside the church window and I am no longer overwhelmed. Even on a stark, gray winter day the prairie is expansive and welcoming and peaceful. I know that for some of you the fields represent toil, but for me they simply represent peace, the beauty of God's Creation. I was a city girl (in Fargo, ND), but I spent many summers playing at my ancestors' farm near Enderlin, ND. My heart would swell as we got further into the prairie, where the sky was endless and the fields changed color by the day. I determined around the age of 12 that my favorite place in the whole world was this little butte (it looks miniscule today) in the middle of a cow pasture on The Farm (it's always capitalized in our family). It had one tree clinging to the edge of it and was covered with flowers at certain times of year. From it I could see forever.

I have not lived on the Northern Plains for 15 years, and the only time I lived closer to the prairie was when I did a pastoral internship in Mayville, ND and could walk two blocks, past the grain elevator, into the sunset. Now I have a view of the fields from my office, and I anxiously anticipate watching them come alive, change colors, and show me all God's glory come spring. Even now, they lift my spirits and calm my nerves, because I can see God's hand at work in the stubble from last year's crops and even in the snow which fell upon it.

Why am I telling you these things? One reason is to give you a better idea of who I am. I am also telling you because it is my simple hope that, if you do not already, you will begin to take notice of the land in which you live. I have heard many places referred to as "God's country" but this is it for me. I don't expect every one of you to feel the way I do about the prairie but I hope you will at least take the time to appreciate your surroundings and God's hand in creating them. I get the feeling that many of you already do notice and love the open spaces and all they contain (yes, these "open" spaces are full of life). I hope those of you who go about life with blinders on will take those blinders off and breathe in the expansiveness of God's Creation.

I will close with the words of North Dakota poet Marlene Norris: "A watchful sky projects in depth / The conscience of the earth, / Amid the texts of shifting winds / And scattered streaks of calm." Or, in these simple words from Genesis... "and God saw that it was good."

May God be with all of us as we enter into ministry together and as we soak up the beauty around us.

4. Where and how are OGHS funds shared?

The United Church of Christ responds to development, disaster, and refugee needs in more than eighty countries, including the United States. Funding decisions are made by asking our worldwide mission partners, "What would you have us do with you?" The United Church of Christ responds as a member of ecumenical organizations such as Church World Service and Action by Churches Together, International. We also support the direct mission efforts of churches and church-based organizations with whom the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have direct partnerships with through Global Ministries. Nearly one-fourth of the UCC's offering is shared through Church World Service to support refugee, disaster, development, and advocacy programs.

5. How many dollars are given to the UCC's OGHS offering?

On average, annual OGHS special offering receipts total \$3 million. Nearly seventy percent of UCC congregations participate.

6. What percentage of OGHS donations are used directly for mission?

On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 92 cents are used directly for mission programming. Most administrative costs are paid with gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic Support and endowment funds. Due to decreases in OCWM Basic Support, beginning in 2004 both mission and administrative costs for refugee ministries are supported by One Great Hour of Sharing.

7. Where's the Accountability?

Currently, the OGHS Program Committee of the Wider Church Ministries Board meets at each of its semi-annual meeting dates to review expenditures and to address initiatives to increase the promotion of the offering for the United Church of Christ.

8. How can I contribute to One Great Hour of Sharing?

The OGHS special mission offering is received through local UCC congregations and all UCC members are encouraged to participate in this way. Local churches will forward gifts to the conference office and all gifts will be forwarded to the United Church of Christ, 700 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, OH 44115-1100. Secure on-line contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing may also be made at 222.ucc.org/oghs.

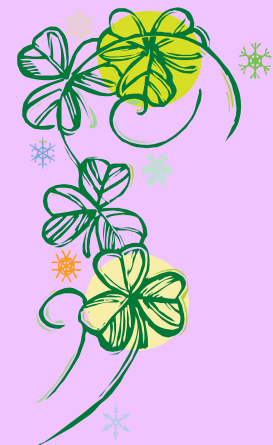
Helping Those in Need

Checking Our Balance

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die; a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted...
(Ecclesiastes 3: 1-2)



A time to break down our budgets – at home or church -- in new ways, and a time to build them up by asset mapping. A time to weep for recession, unemployment and homelessness, and a time to meet doomsayers with humor and hope. A time to mourn for the time-famine of contemporary families, and a time to dance with our faithful volunteers. A time to embrace generosity, and a reminder to refrain from embracing consumerism. A time to keep – recycle, re-use, re-new – in church and home -- and time to throw away responsibly.
